Problems With Voting Today

#1 - Voter turnout is TOO low

Voter Turnout is way, way, WAY too low

#2 - Voter turnout is TOO low, especially for youth

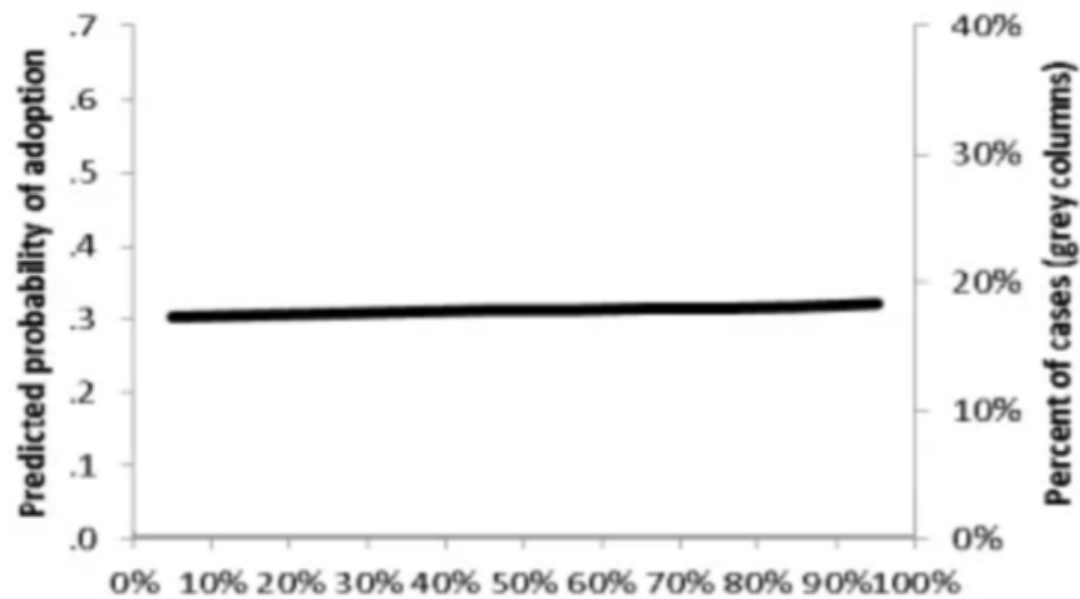

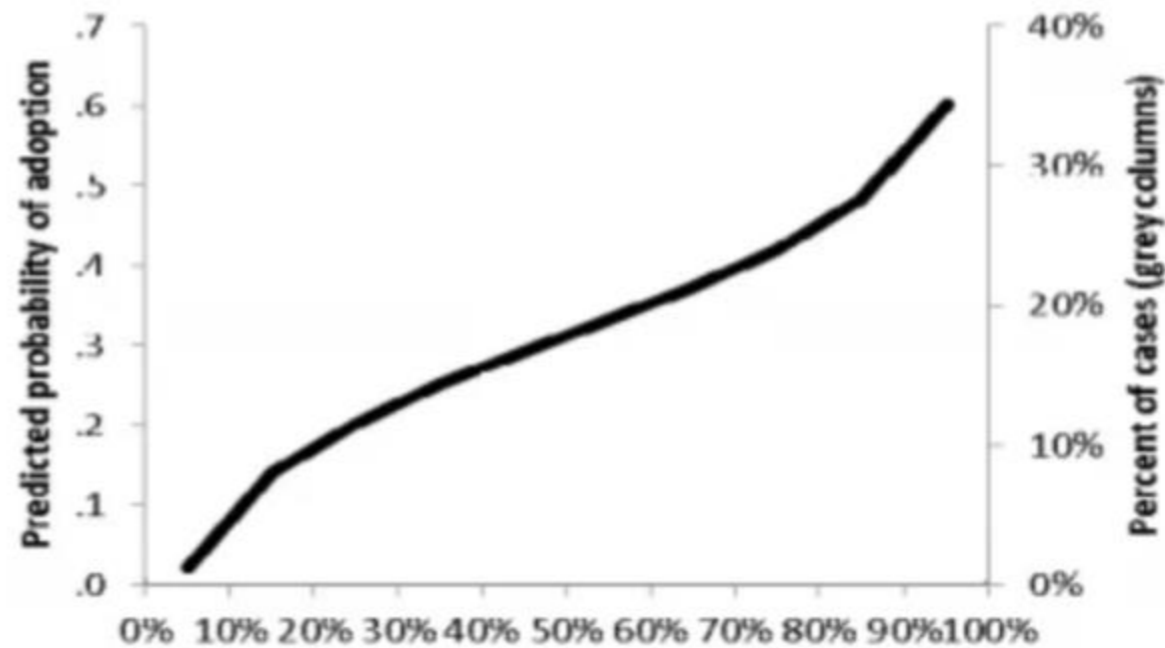
#3 - People don't feel like their voice will be heard

RANKED-CHOICE VOTING



 **Your Ranked-Choice Ballot**

Rank up to 4 candidates.
Mark no more than 1 oval in each column.

How does Ranked-Choice Voting work?

1. Voters rank his/her preferred candidate (if they want)

2. If the winner has more than 50% then he or she is the WINNER!

If not...then

3. Candidate with the fewest first-preference votes is eliminated and second preference choices are allocated to remaining candidates

4. This process is repeated until either 2 people remain OR someone obtains a majority of votes

Count the votes!

Each ballot counts for its highest ranked continuing candidate.
If all seats are filled, you are done.

Are any candidates above the threshold?

They win election

Reweight their votes and continue

Yes

No

Eliminate the last-place candidate

and continue

What Do We Have Now?

Plurality (winner take all) NOW

- Winner declared <50% of vote

- Does not have support from most citizens

- High voter dissatisfaction and reduced future turnout

Majority (IDEAL RCV)

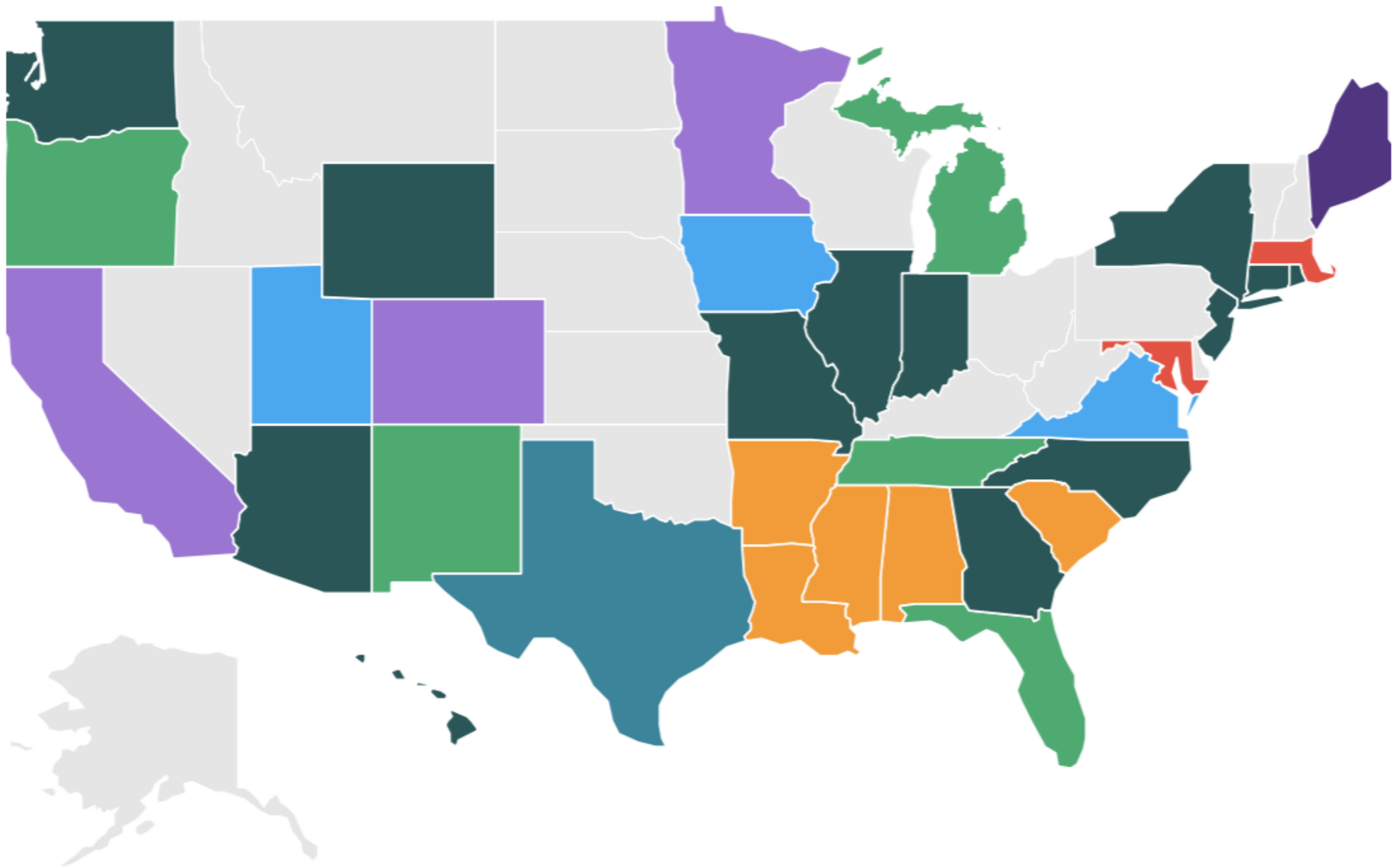
- Require winner to have >50% of the votes

- Represents most of the electorate

- Higher voter satisfaction and participation

**Does this Ranked-Choice Voting
method even work????**

Even Illinois has RCV overseas to rank their candidates!

Results!

Voter turnout surpassed expectations in all three jurisdictions in Santa Fe, San Francisco, and Maine

Implementation of RCV was smooth/inexpensive (re: Maine)

In San Francisco, turnout reached 52.6%, far higher than 29.7% before RCV

Avoids run-off elections and negative advertising

RCV helped elect more people of color in San Francisco - 37% to 72% and even more women/women of color hold office

No voting system is perfect, but RCV
is the most pragmatic and we have
already seen it!
