#1 - Voter turnout is TOO low







How does Ranked-Choice Voting work?


1. Voters rank his/her preferred candidate (if they want)

2. If the winner has more than 50% then he or she is the WINNER!

If not...then

3. Candidate with the fewest first-preference votes is eliminated and second preference choices are allocated to remaining candidates

4. This process is repeated until either 2 people remain OR someone obtains a majority of votes




What Do We Have Now?

| Plurality (winner take all) NOW | Majority (IDEAL RCV) |
|---|---|
| - Winner declared <50% of vote | - Require winner to have >50% of the votes |
| -Does not have support from most citizens | - Represents most of the electorate |
| - High voter dissatisfaction and reduced future turnout | - Higher voter satisfaction and participation |

Does this Ranked-Choice Voting method even work????

Results!

Voter turnout surpassed expectations in all three jurisdictions in Santa Fe, San Fransisco, and Maine

Implementation of RCV was smooth/inexpensive (re: Maine)

In San Francisco, turnout reached 52.6%, far higher than 29.7% before RCV

Avoids run-off elections and negative advertising

RCV helped elect more people of color in San Francisco - 37% to 72% and even more women/women of color hold office

No voting system is perfect, but RCV is the most pragmatic and we have already seen it!
